Word from the Pastor

Easter Greetings to All!

As I write this note, Easter Sunday is just a few days away. With Easter coming earlier than normal this year, it really feels like we've just finished celebrating Christmas!

On the surface, the two holidays don't seem to have much in common. Christmas is a celebration of the birth of Christ, while Lent and Easter focus on the death and resurrection of Christ. Although the two different holidays celebrate very different aspects of Christ's earthly life, they both focus on the one central theme of Christ's earthly ministry: That there is hope and a new beginning every time we think we have reached a dead end. As Christians, we are not exempt from life's trials and tribulations. But we do have the assurance that each time we stumble and fall, God will be there to help us get back on our feet. And each time we mess up and do the wrong thing, we are forgiven for our mistakes and given the opportunity to try again.

While we continually talk about how much the world has changed and how different people are nowadays, one thing doesn't seem to have changed. We still get trapped by our own guilt. At a recent Bible study, we talked about how negative reinforcement seems to be a much greater motivator than we realize. We learn from our mistakes. In our childhood and adolescence, it wasn't logical explanations from our parents that motivated us to do better...it was usually guilt that got us to do the right thing.

Christmas and Easter challenge the whole concept of guilt. The message is that we are forgiven and don't have to put up with guilt any more. But we kind of ignore that message and instead focus on buying gifts, filing baskets with candy, and commercializing these holidays. I'm not saying that we shouldn't buy Christmas gifts and that we can't color Easter eggs or eat lots of chocolate. You just thought I was going to say that because you feel guilty....

Until we shed the guilt, we cannot become the people that God wants us to be, hence the invitation to be forgiven and to be loved for who you are.

May hope and peace fill your hearts during this Easter season, $Pastor\ \mathcal{M}ike$





A profound love and influence is harmony - certainly in music, but also in life. Music has been a mainstay, tremendous joy, and continuing thread throughout the many changes that have come along over the years. Ken Sills, is a fine guitarist and singer in his own right. They have been playing together for over a year, perfecting originals and covers of songs they love from the wealth of wonderful music out there, with much attention to Ken's leads and the vocal harmonies...The pup is Sammy!



Bill Benson started his musical journey as a drummer...but got tired of being in the back. He hails from Unionville, CT. He has been writing music since he was 16...and can find a song in almost any situation! He has a very comfortable, easy listening folk/acoustic rock style...and is sometimes a little bit country! He is a frequent attraction at LaSalle's Market in Collinsville, during open mic nights on Friday evenings, and has performed on Better Connecticut, The Bitter End in NYC, Blue Back Square in Hartford, Jitters in Southington and Cheney Hall in Manchester. 





The Easter Lily. For many, the beautiful trumpet-shaped white flowers symbolize purity, virtue, innocence, hope and life—the spiritual essence of Easter.

History, mythology, literature, poetry and the world of art are rife with stories and images that speak of the beauty and majesty of the elegant white flowers. Often called the "white-robed apostles of hope," lilies were found growing in the Garden of Gethsemane after Christ's agony. Tradition has it that the beautiful white lilies sprung up where drops of Christ's sweat fell to the ground in his final hours of sorrow and deep distress. Churches continue this tradition at Easter time by banking their altars and surrounding their crosses with masses of Easter Lilies, to commemorate the resurrection of Jesus Christ and hope of life everlasting.







The Easter Lily...continued

I he pure white lily has long been closely associated with the Virgin Mary. In early paintings, the Angel Gabriel is pictured extending to the Virgin Mary a branch of pure white lilies, announcing that she is to be the mother of the Christ Child. In other paintings, saints are pictured bringing vases full of white lilies to Mary and the infant Jesus. St. Joseph is depicted holding a lily-branch in his hand, indicating that his wife Mary was a virgin.

The legend is told that when the Virgin Mary's tomb was visited three days after her burial, it was found empty save for bunches of majestic white lilies. Early writers and artists made the lily the emblem of the Annunciation, the Resurrection of the Virgin: the pure white petals signifying her spotless body and the golden anthers her soul glowing with heavenly light....
