Word from the Pastor

Easter Greetings!

Although Easter Day has passed, the Easter season has just begun. According to the church calendar, Easter is 50 days long, and runs from Easter Day through Pentecost.

Modern day Christians benefit from a historical perspective of Easter. The eleven remaining disciples, along with the other followers of Jesus, needed all 50 days to fully comprehend the events of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter Day. During that time, they felt disappointment, confusion, and fear. Nothing made sense at first. Things didn't happen the way they imagined. In their minds, Jesus entered Jerusalem to become a world leader. Instead, he was crucified. On Easter morning, the women went to the tomb to show their love and respect to their fallen leader. Instead, they found an empty tomb. The disciples gathered in a secret location to develop plans on how to survive. Instead, Jesus appeared to them and commanded them to continue the work He started.

Our lives are very similar to lives of the disciples during the first 50 days of Easter. We all go through ups and downs. There are many times when we feel that nothing happens according to our best laid plans. We Christians are not immune from disappointment, confusion and fear. But we do have the benefit of a historical perspective of Easter. We know that because of Jesus' crucifixion and resurrection, our mistakes are forgiven and we are called to learn from them and move forward. We have learned from personal experience that we are not exempt from trial and tribulations. Instead, we have the assurance that God is always with us, and that there is nothing in all of creation that will ever separate us from the love of God.

We are the Easter people, and I hope you'll celebrate God's love and forgiveness not only during the 50 days of Easter, but throughout the year!



WORKING TOGETHER TO REACH OUT TO CHILDREN IN OUR COMMUNITY

A simple thought of helping others, when acted upon, can provide a ray of sunshine for those who really need it.

In late February I found myself thinking about the children at the homeless shelter in Winsted and was wondering if the three children whose story we learned Christmas time have since found an apartment to call home. So I picked up the phone and called Bruce, the director of the homeless shelter at the Winsted Y. He shared the news that those children were no longer there and that they had a home now. Then I asked how many children are at the shelter now. He told me that there were eight children currently living in the shelter. I then asked if would it be helpful if First of Winsted put Church together Easter Baskets for the at the shelter to have on Easter morning. Bruce said " I've never had anyone think of that before, that would be good if you did that, but just one thing can you call me about a week before to confirm the number of children here then, as it's transient and we may have more or less by then?"

A few days later the Church Cabinet agreed it was a wonderful Easter outreach to the children at the Winsted Homeless Shelter. The following Sunday an announcement was made that we would be putting together eight Easter baskets for children and the shelter, and we needed the congregation's help. We

were looking for eight(8) of each of the following items: peeps, chocolate bunnies, pin wheels, toothbrushes. coloring books, crayons, jump ropes, slinky's, small windup toys, jelly beans, side walk chalk. children's book and silly putty or play dough. A display was made and placed on the altar with a tag for each item to take the tag for what you wanted to contribute, totaling one hundred four (104) items. To my total amazement almost by the time I got to the area to select a tag almost all the tags were gone that first Sunday.

The items were brought back in the weeks leading up to Palm Sunday and by Palm Sunday the area between the pulpit and the organ was totally covered with an overflowing amount of Easter basket goodies. When sorting the items into piles so that each basket had one of each item we found that we had fifteen(15) packages of peeps and forty (40) colorina books. fourteen (14) toothbrushes, four(4) packages of play dough and sixteen (16) single play dough, plenty of jelly beans and chocolate eggs. Needless to say, in the end we had enough stuff to make fourteen (14) complete Easter baskets. Now the problem to be solved was what to do with all this extra stuff! When calling Bruce at shelter a few days before Palm Sunday I learned that the number of children was down to four(4), leaving ten(10) baskets too many. This was a fantastic problem to have as we had an over-abundance of Easter items due to the kind, generous and open hearted members and friends of First Church. We could touch the lives of ten (10) more children. We just needed to figure out how to get to those who needed these baskets.

The food distribution at the Interfaith Food Bank in Winsted which happens on Tuesday and Friday mornings came to mind. Joannie knows Millie, the director/coordinator at Interfaith Food Bank in the Salvation Army Winsted Office. So Joannie picked up the phone and called Millie at home on Monday evening to ask if we could come earlier before the distribution began at 10:00 as we had nine (9) Easter baskets we'd like to give to families who may need them for their children on Easter morning. Millie

was overwhelmed and thought it a terrific idea and even told Joannie she'd be there early to receive them.

When we made the delivery to the early Tuesday Food Bank morning there was a sparkle in Millie's eye and she was so delighted to be there early to receive these baskets. She also gave Joannie and me a tour of the small distribution area, the shelves and a talk about what they get, how they are doing with food collection and shared with us the items that one doesn't think of to donate to a food bank such as toilet paper, toothpaste. toothbrushes, shampoo and such. Millie said, "Your church always treats us well."

One(1) of the ten baskets was given to a mother who had been living at the FISH shelter in Torrington with her two year old son and was in an apartment now, but currently still doesn't have the resources to buy Easter basket items for her son.

Today when dropping off the four(4) baskets to Bruce at the homeless shelter, again he was overtaken by our generosity as he couldn't believe how full the baskets were and all done up in bags and nicely tied so they can easily store them till Easter morning. He shared with me that three (3) of the children there with their mother have been approved for an apartment effective May 1st.

This simple outreach effort by so many in our congregation had more of an impact than what any one of us could have done individually. And unless we've been with those who are in a shelter or rely on the food bank to get their food and personal items, we'll never really know the impact of buying one coloring book or one chocolate rabbit. Many of those items are things we take for granted. But together, we helped make a difference on Easter Day in the life of a child right here in Winsted. If all it did was bring them a moment of joy, we did what Jesus asks us to do. Hopefully those baskets allowed them to enjoy a piece of chocolate, a peep or two, ielly beans, even get to jump rope or walk a slinky down the stairs. Thanks to you, some children in town will have a bigger smile on Easter Sunday.


