Updates from Mexico...Day 1

Saludos desde la Ciudad de Mexico (Greetings from Mexico City)

We are connecting to our second flight of the day. So far everything has gone as planned, a true blessing from God!

Everyone was in the Church parking lot at 4am this morning. I was the last to arrive, but I did show up exactly at 4am and everyone else was there waiting for me. (The speed at which I had to drive on Route 44 to get there on time will only be known by me and by God....). We packed up our three rental vehicles: a Chevrolet Impala, a 7 passenger Chevrolet Traverse, and a Chevrolet Tahoe. Avis did us a favor the night before when the car reserved for me was never to be found. Because of the 30+ minute delay in getting me a vehicle, the manager let me have the Tahoe, which made every other vehicle on the road look small. We just barely fit all the luggage into the three vehicles, in part due to the duffle bag full of auto and truck parts and a 270 piece toolkit in its own case.

Thanks to John Morris for driving all of us rental vehicle drivers to Bradley Airport on Friday night. And thanks to Glenell, Debby and Laura (our back up driver) for being willing to drive the group to JFK in the middle of the night.

The drive to JFK was uneventful. We arrived early enough to park the vehicles and check ourselves in for the flight. As the Aeromexico clerk was telling me that I was going to be charged \$150 for excess luggage, God intervened once again....and because of my Delta frequent flier status, I was upgraded to business class, which raised my luggage allowance to three bags and meant that we did not have too many bags.

The flight to Mexico City was uneventful. Most slept for at least a part of the trip. The ride was actually pretty smooth, until we began the descent into Mexico City. That's when you can notice the difference in training between US pilots and Mexican pilots. I liken the speed at which they descend into the mountain valley and the sharp banking turns, along with the unpredictable winds because of mountain peaks up to 12,000 feet above sea level, to a ride in a 60's vintage VW bug taxi through the streets of Mexico City....

We really like having Bailey McCaw with us. He's the only one of our group who hasn't been on a Mexico Mission Trip in the past. In addition to being the youngest and newest member off the group, it was the first time he flew on an aircraft. It was really neat watching his expressions as we took off and then landed in Mexico City.

Upon arrival in Mexico City, we went through immigrations and customs....all without a hitch. All our luggage arrived, and when we went through customs, no one got the infamous "red light" that requires your luggage to be inspected. We passed through security again for our connecting flight and met Perla and Francisco, two of the four Mexicans joining our group this year.

Everything is going like clockwork, and everyone is doing fine. Thanks to everyone back at home who helped make this Mission Trip possible!

Day 2 from Pastor Mike...

It's just before 7am in Oaxaca and I'm watching the sunrise at the Simply Silesia center of operations. Since I have to send messages from my iPad, I will be short and to the point! continued on page 3

- 1. The center of ops has developed a lot in a few years. There is now electricity thanks to a \$16,000 power line from the nearest paved road. That also means we have refrigeration, running water (don't drink tap water if you want to work the rest of the week...), refrigeration, and many other things we take for granted. Instead of tents, we now sleep in bunk beds in two rooms.
- 2. Living conditions have changed, but a ton of rice still takes a long time to bag. After breakfast on Sunday we made bags of 800 grams of rice for each of the 3000 people who will receive food at a distribution in two weeks. We broke for lunch and continued bagging til 3pm and got ready to go to Casa Hogar to meet up with the other First Church team.
- 3. The "special dinner" we served at Casa Hogar to the residents was chicken tenders and French fries from Sam's Club. You should have seen the clerk's face when I stepped up to the register and asked for 40 orders of tenders and 40 large fries... The redeeming part of the meal was green salad prepared by our Casa Hogar team. I was surprised that almost all of the residents had salad. Expected them to not like veggies but they have fresh veggies so rarely that it all got eaten.
- 4. Ben, Jason and Bailey changed the oil, filter, glow plugs, fuel filter, wiper blades, air filter, etc. On the Mercedes minibus used to transport the kids in wheelchairs. On a test run later that evening to Walmart (Sam's Club already closed), it ran flawlessly. In the test run Jason figured out that one tire was severely under inflated causing steering wobble at high speeds.
- 5. Mary, Kendra, Ben and Bailey painted the wood playground furniture orange (we don't pick the colors...).
- 6. You can fit more in a Mexican closet than in one at home. Debby, Cindy, Laura, Judy and Glenell removed more school supplies from a tiny closet than you could fit in the basement of our church. After cleaning out the mouse nest and other unnecessary stuff, some scoop supplies were packed to go to the second, more remote Casa Hogar in the just tuned up Mercedes.
- 7. Javier, Enrique and Francisco, three of the Mexicans who joined our team, diagnosed the reason rain has been leaking into two of the three classrooms at Casa Hogar. They had to prop a rickety ladder against a tree to reach the corrugated metal roof which is so thin that it cannot support the weight of a person. They used a series of broomsticks duct tapped together to remove debris from the room and somehow managed to get silicone Caulk we brought from Connecticut.
- 8. Jaron was playing soccer with one of the Casa Hogar teens as soon as the rest of our team finished painting the outside walls of the classrooms.
- 9. Today we paint the insides of the classrooms, do work on 4 other vehicles (we brought a thousand dollars of auto parts with us) and possibly conduct a tag sale (everyone's Spanish will be practiced!).
- 10. A puppy is smarter than your pastor. A bit after midnight I was in the kitchen doing some things when the puppy at the center of operations suddenly appeared. She stood by the door and I just went on with my activities. After a minute she gave up on me and just went on the floor! Never knew puppies could be housebroken at such a young age...

We've already accomplished a lot and I give thanks for the wonderful people representing our church here in Oaxaca. Mexico Mission Day 3

It really hasn't rained since we arrived, so we have not had to deal with the mud of prior years and we've been incredibly productive.

Yesterday we painted the three classrooms at the School at Casa Hogar both inside and out. It may not sound like much but it involved a lot of cleaning and prep before and setting up afterwards. But the work went fast with Cindy, Julie, Laura, Glenell and Debby leading the charge with Jes, Mary, Kendra, Natalie Perla, and Rebecca. The leaks in the classroom roof of the second classroom got fixed, and the roof repaired the day before was water tested to ensure it no longer leaked. That involved finding a hose, which was not readily available and climbing on the ladder while someone else held it. We were hoping for rain so we would n

ot need to use the water (they ran out of water the day before at Casa Hogar), so now you know why it hasn't rained!).

Another group, including Andrew, Javier, Enrique and Francisco corrected the wiring and replaced a bunch of plugs and switches throughout the facility The majority of plus in the kitchen did not work, and when you flipped the light switch in

the kitchen and other rooms you were oftentimes jolted with 120 volts. Although we would have liked to have re-wired most of the facility, the staff was grateful to have working plugs and light switches that don't shock you.

After replacing the spark plugs, plug wires, oil and filters on the truck of the remote Casa Hogar facility, the pastor was so pleased that the truck could drive upnhills without bucking that he told us not to replace the points rotor and distributor cap. For those who know cars, it's been about 20 years since cars in the US had those parts...that's how old this truck was. According to the pastor, it had not been tuned up for as long as he could remember. We tried to adjust the parking brake but the rear brake shoes were too worn to be effective. Changing the brakes will be a project for us on another

trip...

The pit crew consisting of Ben, Bailey, Jaron and Jason also did maintenance on two other vehicles. Jaron replaced the inside door handles on the truck so that for the first time in recent memory you can open the doors from the inside of the truck. It had been very common to get locked inside the truck because the windows would not roll down (power window motors are shot) and it wouldn't start...they would just wait for a nice person to walk by and open the door from the outside!

The day was not all work. There was a spirited multiple-national soccer game on the cement court with both females and males participating. And in the late afternoon we accomplished so much that most went to the village of San Bartolo for a visit.

We are getting ready for breakfast and another day of work. Hasta mañana!

Mexico Mission Day 4

We are midway through our week in Mexico and time has flown by. As Glenell said when I asked the group to sum up our experiences in a sentence or two, words cannot fully describe our first four days in Mexico. We are all exhausted from each day's tasks, but we are gratified by the opportunity to work as a team and to interact with many local residents.

Yesterday the Simply Smiles team sifted sand for the base underneath the pavers being laid onto the parking area of the center of operations, used hammers to final finish hundreds of pavers that got laid down yesterday, and broke down kilo bags of salt into half pound bags for about 2500 people. In the afternoon we went to the city dump and picked up a dozen of the children of the residents who make a living by shift

ing through the garbage heaps to collect plastic bottles for recycling. We spent three hours at a park next to the airport playing everything from Mexican children's games led by Francisco, one of the Mexicans on our team, to throwing frisbees and footballs, to making friendship bracelets and squirting each other with water pistols.

Our Casa Hogar team visited us (the Simply Smiles team) in the morning to deliver us some supplies. While Ben and Baily worked on the second Nissan truck, Kendra, Mary, Laura, Perla and Debby continued painting.

Today the Simply Smiles team takes an 8 hour ride to the village in the jungle. And the Casa Hogar team is being forced to take a "mandatory rest day" and will visit the Monte Alban archeological site, the Tule tree, and then have dinner with Carol, the director of Casa Hogar.

We have no idea how well we can communicate from the jungle. There is now a cell tower in the town where the paved road ends (about a 45 minute drive away) and when you stand on a hill and face that town at night you can sometimes pick up a signal. But if you don't hear from us until Saturday, just assume all is well!

As the moon sets and the sun rises, people are beginning to rise for a 6:30 breakfast. Time to get to work!

Mexico Mission Day 5

We arrived to Santa Maria Tepexipana in the late afternoon. We were greeted with the typical afternoon downpour and a ton of Mosquitos and sand flies.

The trip from Oaxaca was exactly as planned with many stops along the way. We shared some incredible quesadillas and cafe de olla at a stop at a friend of the Simply Smiles staff. Many purchased colorfully painted animals made from balsa wood scraps. We had lunch at the highest altitude along the way...about 12000 feet above sea level.

People in the village now recognize us. A gentleman took a few of us to a spring where crystal clear water emerges from a rock. Three six year old girls taught me how to skip and wore me out skipping the length of the village. A fifth grade boy led me through the darkness to a small store in a home to buy clorox to add to the dishwashing water. We talked about all the animals in the area and he scared me as he suddenly picked up a bunch of stones. I asked what he was doing and he said he would use the stones to protect me from some unfriendly dogs in the area. He was dead serious...

Andrew, Jason, Jaron, Francisco, Gina and Pete valiantly tried to defend our dignity in a spirited soccer game on the cement basketball court of the local elementary school. Most of the locals played barefoot!

While we can do without the Mosquitos and mud, the warmth of the people makes it all worth it.

A corrugated metal dorm building replaced the tents we previously used. Tomorrow we will mix cement and pour the floor for the new kitchen.

The Casa Hogar team is still in Oaxaca City and should have enjoyed their mandatory day off. Hopefully I will be able to get a cell phone signal and get an update for tomorrow's report.

PS - updates from the village are being sent at night because the 3G signal is so weak that it is nonexistent during the day and at night I have to stand on the edge of a hill and face the closest town with a cell tower to send messages!
