Word from the Pastor

Dear Members & Friends,

As you may know, both our Sunday School program and our worship services normally follow what is known as the Revised Common Lectionary. The Lectionary was an ecumenical effort of many different denominations and it suggests certain scriptures for each Sunday. The main benefit of the Lectionary is that it forces me to reflect and preach on scriptures that I might not personally select. The Lectionary also follows writers and books of the Bible rather than themes. For example, the Lectionary at a certain time will take us through the entire Gospel of Matthew, rather than just jumping between the Gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke. That allows us to hear and experience the totality of each author's Book of the Bible. And it keeps me from preaching on themes or topics that are only near and dear to my heart....

Life is often like the Lectionary. We are taken to places we might not have thought about going. Or for that matter, places where we never ever wanted to go. Our recent Sunday scriptures have followed the journey of the Jewish people from Egypt toward the Promised Land. The clear message we hear as we read those passages is that even when traveling on a blessed journey (heading to a special place promised to them by God), the unexpected happens. At certain times, the people found themselves being pursued by enemies, hungry, and thirsty. But we also read that each time, God heard their prayers and provided them with what they needed. God gave them the strength to endure their challenges and provided them with what they needed to continue their journey. Interestingly enough, I haven't found passages where God explains WHY the challenges took place. God just confirmed his presence in the bad situations and gave them what they needed to overcome their challenges.

Human beings are very inquisitive. As the father of four daughters, I can guarantee you that the three most regularly used words of each when they were three years old was, "Why?", "Why?" and "Why?". We want to understand everything that happens in our world. As we all continue to mourn the loss of Owen Lovejoy, I hope that we can embrace the realization that God is with us in this time of challenge and that God will provide us what we need to overcome this challenge so that we can continue to do God's will. Owen touched the lives of so many by sharing his time, sense of humor, and concern. I don't recall Owen focusing on the "Why's" of life, but instead dedicating his efforts to meeting the needs of those around him. That's what God wants us to do.



Slow Cooker Apple Butter



Serves: 8
Quick and easy apple butter made in the crock pot.

Ingredients

6 apples of your choice- I used Gala but you can mix and match

1 tablespoon cinnamon

squeeze of lemon juice

1/4 cup water

1/4 cup sugar

1/4 cup brown sugar

Instructions

- 1. Core the apples and give them a rough chop.
- 2. Place in slow cooker.
- 3. Add cinnamon, water and both sugars.
- 4. Gently stir.
- 5. Close the lid and let this cook away for about 4½ hours on low.
- Check it periodically to make sure it is still moist and the apples are not dried out. Add more water as needed.
- 7. Remove from Crock Pot after 4½ hours and place in a food processor or blender.
- 8. Add a squeeze of lemon juice if you like.
- 9. Puree until smooth.
- 10. If the apple butter looks more like applesauce and doesn't have the rich brown color, just place back in the crock pot and cook for another hour or so on high heat. Leave the Crock uncovered and check it often

Why Really, Really Pushing your Teen to Come to Church is a Good Thing

I understand that parenting teenagers is hard.

I helped raise two of them, and they survived to tell the tales. Which they do with relish. (Yes, being raised by two pastors has its own collection of horror stories.)

I understand that lives are busy and you have to pick and choose your battles wisely and that it's a crazy world out there with a bazillion demands on time and energy. I get that. And I *still* think that it's worth it to lean on your teenagers about the whole church thing.

Every year we get questions from parents about whether or not to insist on their kids attending church or confirmation class. Their concerns sound something like these;

1. I'm afraid if I insist that s/he go to church, it will turn him/her off of Christianity completely.

Hm. Does that same kind of concern extend to other areas of life you think are important?

For example, do you think that insisting that they go to school will turn them off of education? That it might sour them on going to college or keep them from a lifelong love of learning?

Or do you worry that pushing them to eat healthily will turn them into the kind of adults who eat Oreo's for breakfast every day?

Probably not.

Parents insisting that their kids do things that are good for them is what parents do.

Besides, if your child was baptized as an infant, as many of ours are in the Presbyterian Church, then you promised to bring your child up to know the love of God, and the church promised to help you do that.

We can't help you much if your child isn't here.

2. S/he is too busy with sports/homework/lessons, and can't commit to another thing.

I understand busy.

I understand pressure, stress, and overload.

We all need to prioritize, make room for the things we think are most important, both in terms of long-term investment and in immediate quality of life.

Faith is a long-term investment thing, and we do try and make church time meaningful, quality time.

We try to make it worth your while to be there.

3. I want him/her to make her/his own decision about what to believe.

Absolutely.

But they need to know what they are choosing or rejecting.

If you don't take the lead on helping them understand the faith you claim as your own, they will "learn" about it from some dubious sources.

They might learn about it from the movies or TV shows or the internet.

Christianity is usually portrayed in movies and media as simplistic, naïve, bizarre or downright creepy.

Christianity only makes it into the news when there's pedophilia or gay-bashing involved.

Is THAT what you want them to learn that Jesus is about?

Or would you rather your child learn about the Christian faith as part of a mandatory Comparative Religions class in college?

Those classes often teach it as a backwater superstition that is full of inconsistencies and hypocrisy.

I'd steer clear of Jesus, too, if that's where I "learned" about it.

If you leave it up to some of those para-church organizations or TV/radio preachers, they might just end up thinking that faith is neat and tidy and explains the world— until it doesn't - and then where does your youth go to make sense of the broken pieces?

At an actual church, you have people who are all over the map: some have newly formed faith, some have a faith that has been split wide open, and others have a faith that is rising from the broken pieces, stronger and more alive than ever before.

We help one another through the broken places.

The way we believe makes sense until it doesn't, and then God allows it to break open so a new chapter of faith and understanding can take shape.

It's a kind of death and rebirth, and we may do it a number of times in our lives.

Death and resurrection is not just for Jesus, and it's not just about when we die.

It's about our own faith and life.

You learn that in community.

If you outgrow your current understanding of your faith outside of the church, you'll likely just chuck the whole thing and walk away, rather than seeing the new faith God may be fitting you out for.

I've seen enough kids drift away from what they THINK is the Christian faith because their concept of it is being formed outside of a loving and varied community that can hang in there with them all life long, if they'll let it.
